2017 Operational Budget Highlights

- An estimated 5% increase in policing costs. This is due to the City's population exceeding 15,000 in the last Federal Census, which will increase the City's responsibility under the Policing Agreement. The City will need to cover 90% of the municipal policing costs, up from 70%. (Anticipated to come into effect in the Spring of 2017)
- Continuation of the free transit system.
- Tourism advertising campaign and support for the City Wide Sale
- 2017 Municipal Election
- Initiate Concrete Recycling
- Continuation of Sidewalk Repair Initiative
- Continued and enhanced support to Community Groups and Events.

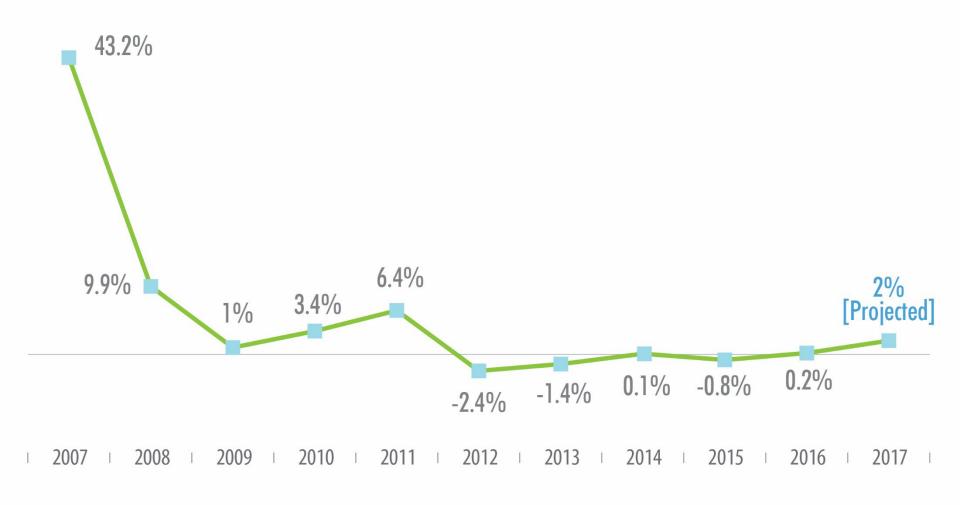


2017 Operational Budget Summary

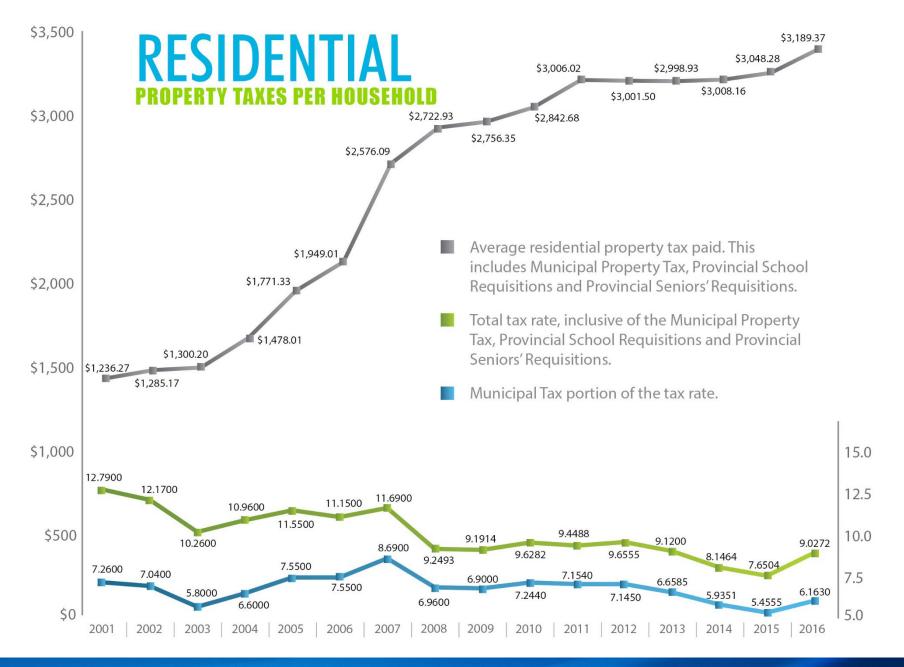
- After transfers to the Capital Budget, the Operating Budget contains about \$42.2 million in operational spending.
- \$44.7 million in the budget will be raised through taxation both in the City of Cold Lake (\$19.5 million) on the CLAWR (\$25.2 million).
- Administration forecasts a 2% average increase in municipal taxes (no tax increases from 2012-2016).
- 5% increase in utility rates is in line with maintaining council's philosophy of cost recovery for utility operations.



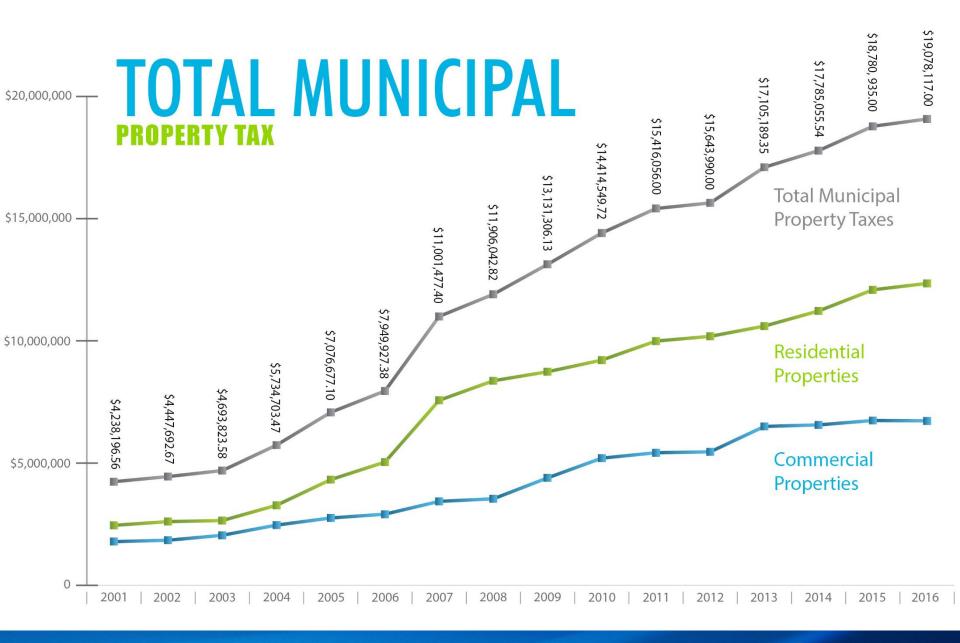
AVERAGE MUNICIPAL TAX INCREASE/DECREASE





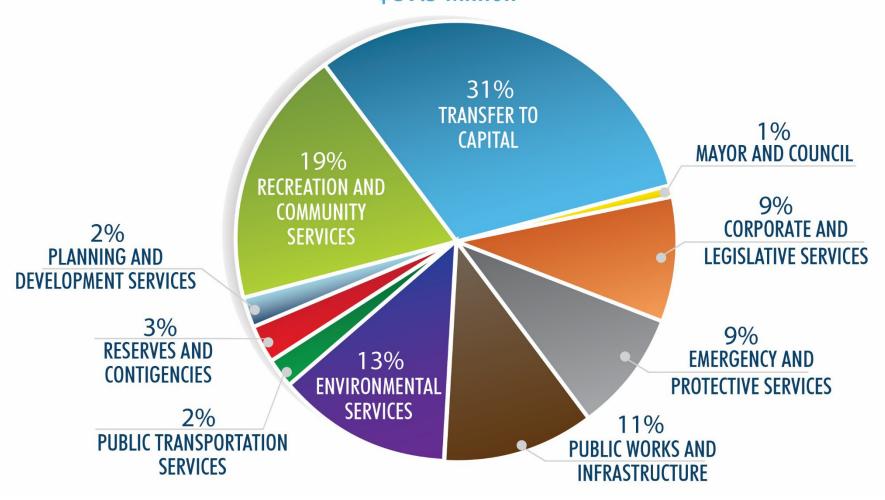








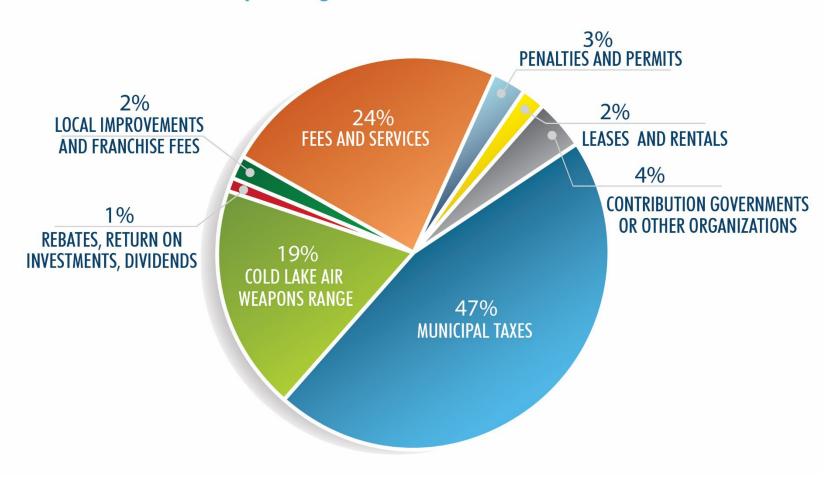
2017 ESTIMATED EXPENSES \$59.5 Million





2017 ESTIMATED OPERATING REVENUE SOURCES

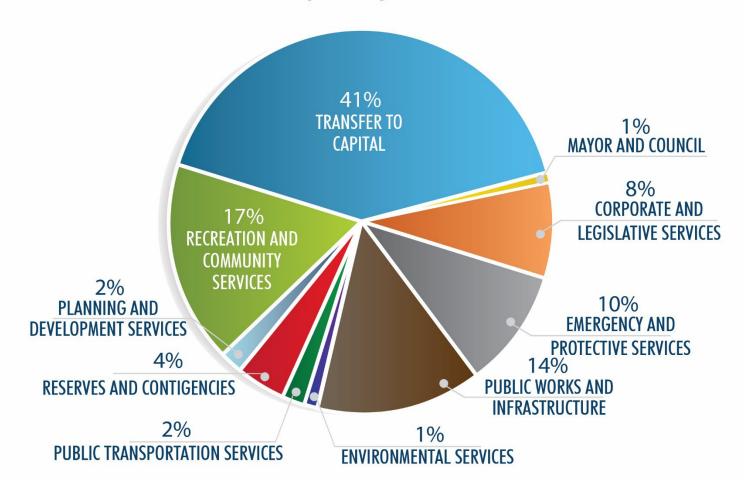
Operating Revenue - \$42.2 Million

CLAWR and the Operating Budget

Of the City's \$42.2 million in operational expenses, \$8 million, or about 19%, comes from CLAWR.

The following programs rely either partially or entirely on CLAWR funding:

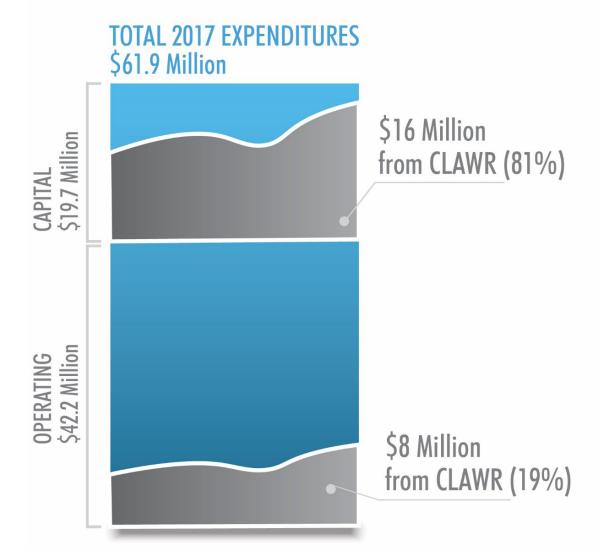
Council invests in the community...

2017 Capital Budget Summary

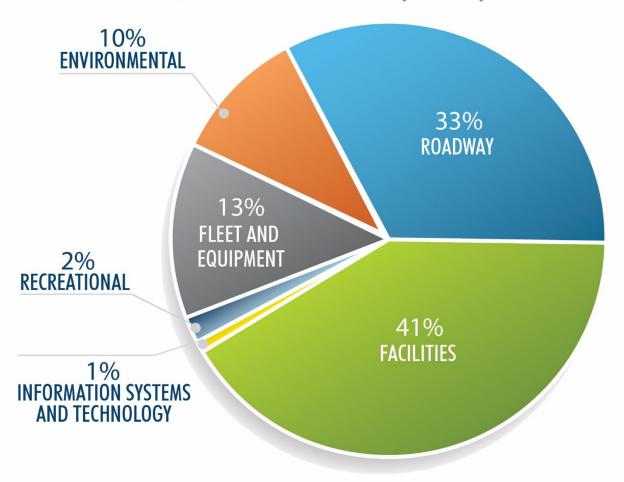
Council passed a \$19.7 million capital budget, including:

- \$8.1 million on facilities infrastructure
- \$6.4 million in spending on roadway infrastructure
- \$2.6 million in spending on the city's fleet and equipment
- \$2 million in environmental and utility spending
- \$410,000 on recreation infrastructure
- \$165,000 on IST infrastructure



2017 CAPITAL BUDGET BY INFRASTRUCTURE

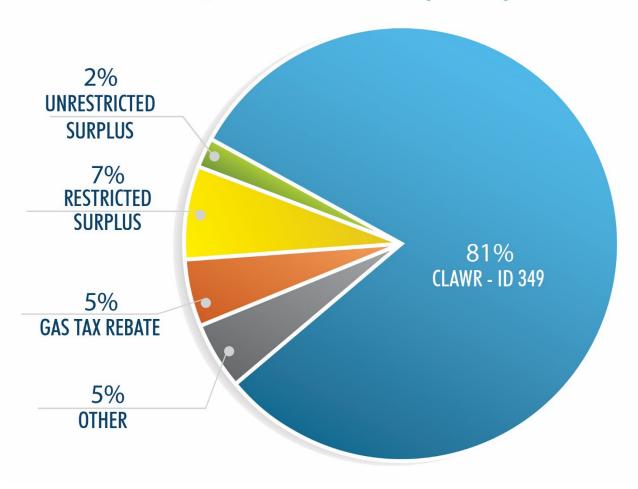
