

Council Commitments (COMMITTEES/APPOINTMENTS)

Attendance at any conference is neither mandatory or promoted with the exception of a few. Careful consideration and consultation relating to council priorities, municipal policies and budget impacts prior to attending various conferences. The following list is not all-inclusive.

Alberta Professional Planners Institute

Annual National Conference – Typically held in July.

Alberta Library Conference

The Alberta Library Conference (ALC) is Alberta's largest provincial library conference, hosted annually by the Library Association of Alberta (LAA) and the Alberta Library Trustees Association (ALTA). Held every year in Jasper, Alberta, this conference provides library staff, trustees, and students with opportunities for professional development and social networking.

This event is typically held in April.

Growing the North Conference

The Growing the North Conference is an annual event in northwestern Alberta that brings together municipal leaders, entrepreneurs, and business people to examine innovation and explore economic development opportunities in the region. It is organized by a group of partners including the Grande Prairie & District Chamber of Commerce, City of Grande Prairie, County of Grande Prairie, and other organizations.

This Conference is usually held in February.

Family and Community Support Services Association (FCSSAA) Conference

With more than 400 FCSS program members, the FCSSAA's larger network covers almost every municipality in Alberta. The annual summit gives members an opportunity to learn, share, collaborate and connect.

This conference is typically held in November.

AB Muni's Convention

This Convention is open to all municipalities in Alberta where there's networking, resolutions, education, and a tradeshow. This conference is typically held in September or October in Edmonton or Calgary in offsetting years.

(This conference has already been included in the post-election council schedule).

AB Muni's President's Spring Leadership Summits

This is typically a two-day gathering of municipal leaders to discuss emerging trends and priority issues amongst municipalities. This conference is typically held in March in Edmonton.

Alberta Municipalities' Summer Municipal Leaders' Caucuses

These are one-day events that are hosted throughout Alberta. Last year the caucus for the Lakeland area held its meeting on June 13, 2024 in Bonnyville. There are four other locations throughout Alberta.

Federation of Canadian Municipalities Conferences (ANNUAL)

Join more than 1,000 elected officials from coast to coast to coast for redefining our future, FCM's Annual Conference and Trade Show and Canada's largest pan-Canadian gathering of elected officials.

This conference is typically held in May/June.

Federation of Canadian Municipalities Conferences (Annual Sustainable Communities Convention)

Alberta Care (Recycling) Conferences

Since 1994, Alberta CARE has worked in cooperation with many different government organizations, industries, recycling groups and non-profit societies – all with the intent of increasing the viability of recycling initiatives in Alberta.

Alberta CARE, in cooperation with Alberta municipalities and organizations, focuses on:

- Coordination of regionally based recycling projects and programs
- Promotion and education of the benefits and importance of recycling
- Increasing public awareness of recycling opportunities and challenges
- Connecting varied private and public interests in relation to the coordination of recycling initiatives and in some cases, playing a leadership role in same
- Identifying potential economic development opportunities associated with recycling and waste management initiatives

This conference is typically held in September.

Canadian Association for Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement (CACOLE) Conferences

CACOLE's Annual Professional Development Conference typically takes place in May in Calgary, bringing together police oversight professionals from across Canada and abroad, with the common goal of improving policing. Participants will have the option of attending virtually or in person.

Subject matter experts will tackle issues of interest to police oversight professionals, members of law enforcement, police unions, government officials and students enrolled in legal programs.

This conference is typically held in May, this event has been held in Lethbridge, and the next scheduled in Westlock, Alberta.

This conference is typically held in December.

Alberta Aviation Council Conference

The Alberta Aviation Council is proud to have closed out another successful conference this spring, this time at the Westin Calgary Airport. This year's event saw engaging keynotes, educational breakout panels, and a ton of networking and collaboration. Also new this year was our annual Canadian AME Competition, which brought together industry to showcase the talent of the aircraft maintenance engineer, while welcoming over 300 local students to explore career opportunities in aviation. This event typically takes place in May.

The 2025 Alberta Aviation and Aerospace Conference will take place May 6th and 7th in Edmonton, Alberta.

Canada's Global Defence and Security Trade Show (CANSEC)

CANSEC is Canada's global defence and security trade show hosted annually in Ottawa since 1998. It is hosted by the Canadian Association of Defence and Security Industries (CADSI), the national industry voice of hundreds of Canadian defence, security and cybersecurity companies. The two-day event showcases leading-edge technology, products and services for land-based, naval, aerospace and joint forces military units. It is not considered a conference, although it typically features up to four keynote addresses during breakfast and lunch meal events.

This event typically takes place in May.

DEFSEC Atlantic Canada Aerospace & Defence Association

DEFSEC Atlantic presented by the Atlantic Canada Aerospace & Defence Association is a major networking opportunity for the Aerospace, Defence and Security industries – the second largest of its kind in Canada. Focused on showcasing Atlantic Canadian opportunities, the show's worldwide reach creates partnership potential for all attendees.

This event typically takes place in October.

Tourism Industry Association Alberta Tourism Advocacy Summit

Hosted at the JW Marriott in Edmonton, the Alberta Tourism Advocacy Summit is the industry's premier event to learn about current government priorities, to gain political and industry insights from experts and media observers, and for you to share your industry points-of-view with elected and nonelected representatives.
